TODAY'S READINGS

Their eyes were opened and they recognized him. (Luke Don't you wish you could have been there when Cleopas and his friend were walking to Emmaus? Wouldn't it have been exciting to hear Jesus interpreting the Scriptures and to see the

look in their eyes when they recognized him in the breaking of the bread?

Well, in a sense, we can be there. Even today, two thousand years after his resurrection, Jesus' word can cause our hearts to burn and bring us to the place where we recognize him. How is this possible? Because the Scriptures do more than teach us about Iesus—they reveal him to us!

As many times as we hear the Scriptures read at Mass, it's good to be reminded that they aren't just words on a page. As St. Paul taught, they are "living and effective, sharper than any twoedged sword" (Hebrews 4:12). Inspired by God, they are filled with his presence. They have the Spirit's own power to bring us his wisdom, peace, and joy. All it takes is listening with faith.

Cleopas and his friend had to walk a long way with Jesus before they recognized him, and sometimes we do too. So be patient with yourself. When you hear the Scriptures proclaimed at Mass, try to imagine that you are there in the middle of the action—in Galilee, in Jerusalem, or wherever the story takes place. Imagine that you can hear Jesus speaking to you. Put aside distractions, and listen for what he may want to say to you personally.

You may not "hear" anything right away. You may not hear anything at all! But that's okay because the Holy Spirit is still at work in you, just as he was working with the Emmaus disciples every step of their journey. He is always pouring out his grace, even when you can't feel it. All you have to do is try your best to keep an open heart. Over time, you will recognize him.

"Holy Spirit, help me to recognize Jesus in his word today. Lord, let your word touch my heart so that you can use me for your alorv!"



EASTER (PASCHAL) CANDLE

The Easter Season is visibly and singularly marked by the large, decorated candle that is prominent in the sanctuary, located by the ambo. The origin of its use during the Easter season is hard to establish in researching the dim past of the early Church. Some church historians suggest that its origin may be in the lamps used in the synagogues and is a reminder from the Old Testament of the 'pillar of fire' denoting 'God's presence.' Some scholars find allusions to it in the early documents of Justin Martyr (103-165AD) who writes of the baptism ceremony being an illumination. In the time of Emperor Constantine (272-337AD), St. Eusebius writes that the "emperor transformed the night of the sacred vigil (Easter) into the brilliancy of day by lighting the whole city with pillars of wax so that this vigil is rendered brighter than the brightest daylight." The descriptor "Paschal" comes from the Hebrew word 'pesach' or Passover, the Jewish feast so closely associated with Holy Week and Easter.

Later Church writings further heightened its symbolic relationship to Christianity. For Christians in these early centuries, the <u>candle</u> came to symbolize Christ: the true light that enlightens each person who comes into this world; its <u>virgin beeswax</u>: the most pure flesh of Christ; its <u>wick</u>: the human soul of Christ; its <u>flame</u>: the divinity of the 2nd Person of the Trinity; the <u>five grains of affixed incense</u>: the sacred wounds of Christ.

Over the centuries, the candle's symbolic representation magnified its fabrication and its use. In many places, at the end of each year, the candle was melted down and used the next year as smaller candles to be carried by the newly baptized at Easter and all those present at the Easter vigil. In the 8th century, it became the practice in Rome to inscribe the candle with the date of the current year, since it was crafted new each year. In many cathedrals, in order for it to be seen throughout the church, its size grew so that in some places, like Salisbury Cathedral in England, it was 36 feet tall. Its principle, but not exclusive, decorations are: the year of its use; the Greek letters for A and O referring to Christ as the "Alpha (beginning)" and "Omega (end);" and five grains of incense in the form of a cross.

The candle begins its liturgical life each year at the Easter vigil on Holy Saturday evening. At the beginning of the vigil celebration, the presider lights the candle from the Easter fire that has just been lit and then inserts the grains of incense and blesses it. The candle, carried by the deacon, leads the way into the cathedral and its flame is used to light the people's candles. After reaching the sanctuary, the candle is placed in its holder next to the ambo where it remains during the entire Easter season, lit for each liturgy until the conclusion of the feast of Pentecost.

During the rest of the liturgical year, it is also lit for all baptisms and for all funerals where it is placed at the head of the deceased's remains, signifying the beginning and ending of one's life in Christ. It is also lit for the sacrament of confirmation and may be lit for the other sacraments (e.g. anointing and matrimony) to mark other important milestones in our Christian life.

EASTER SEASON AND PENTECOST

This great liturgical season of the Church begins with the great octave week that solemnities the feast of Easter by prolonging its celebration over the next eight days ending on the next Sunday. This Sunday following Easter is of equal liturgical solemnity to Easter Sunday and became known in the 1st century as "Whitsunday" in reference to the white vestments used for the liturgy. The solemnity is marked in several ways one of which is the double "alleluia" in the dismissal rite of the Mass during each day of the week. In the ancient Church, this solemn week was devoted to giving great attention to those newly baptized at the Easter vigil. In many cultures, this was the week in which many parents brought their children to church to celebrate and remind them of their own baptism.

The genesis of the fifty-day Easter period and the feast of Pentecost, particularly in the 1st century of the Church's existence, derives from the Jewish celebration of the Old Testament "feast of weeks" (or *Shabuoth* in Hebrew). Much was debated and written by early church scholars about the calculation of the Easter season's fifty days and its theological significance and symbology. The same is true for the feast of the Ascension and its "forty-day" event in the Easter/Pentecost scheme of things.

While the Church gave much attention to the solemnity of the first week following Easter, it established a fifty-day period during which it continuously witnessed to the paschal mystery of the suffering, dying and rising of Jesus Christ. It is from this fifty-day period that the title Pentecost is derived. The period is also marked by the gospels for each Sunday being derived from that of the evangelist John. Another special mark of the season is the use of the sprinkling rite during the liturgy on the Sundays of Easter, another reminder of our baptism. Another distinction of the season is that each Sunday during the period is denoted in the liturgical calendar as the Sunday of Easter, not a Sunday after Easter, indicative of its special relationship to the Easter feast.

The crowning close of the season is the feast we now know as Pentecost which for many centuries was considered the glorious close to the Easter season, especially in the churches of the Eastern rite. While recalling the specific connection to the Easter feast, Pentecost became uniquely devoted to the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples of Jesus gathered in the upper room, praised in hymn by the great sequence "Veni Spiritu Sancte." While historically, white was the color of the vestments used on this feast recalling Easter, red soon became the color to mark this feast, interpreted by Pope Innocent III in the 12th century to symbolize the tongues of fire descending upon the disciples.

In some European countries, customs developed to honor the feast of Pentecost, such as scattering rose leaves from church roofs (Italy), the blowing of trumpets to recall the sound of mighty wind (France), reading of poetic prayers at vespers (Eastern Europe), processions with flowers and green branches (Russia). None of these traditions have carried over to the American church, although the sacrament of confirmation is frequently celebrated on this day in the US.
