TODAY'S READINGS

Please, come. (Mark 5:23)
Imagine what Jairus must have felt as he approached Jesus—his impatience, his urgency, his frustration and anguish. His daughter was dying. Why had he waited so long? Did he regret not coming sooner? His daughter was all he could think about. Her precarious state overshadowed everything else.

What a relief! Jesus agreed to come with him. But would they get there in time? We've got to hurry! Then came a roadblock. A sick woman reached out and touched Jesus, and everything came to a standstill. Why would Jesus let himself be interrupted? There was no time to investigate. At least the disciples were sympathetic, asking, "How can you ask who touched you?"

Then, far away, Jairus glimpsed members of his household coming toward him. Were they happy? He couldn't tell at first. But as he read their body language, his own shoulders slumped. It was as he feared. They were too late. His daughter was dead.

But Jesus kept on going. The mourners at his house mocked him, but Jairus followed Jesus into his daughter's room. Then he saw Jesus raise his girl from death. Astounding! Jesus was big enough. His power was wide enough to take care of everything.

Looking at this story from Jairus' point of view shows us how anxieties can overshadow every aspect of our lives. Like Jairus, we can be so caught up in worry that anxiety trumps everything else. But Jesus has enough healing power, enough mercy and compassion, to go around. He hasn't forgotten you, even when you feel he is delayed. He can care for you even as he takes care of everyone else.

So come and ask Jesus for his help, and then trust him to act on his own schedule. Maybe go one step further, and pray for all the other people he's helping. Jesus is big enough to care for us all!

"Jesus, I trust your ways. Come and pour your healing on everyone who needs you!"

LECTURAS DE HOY

n el Evangelio de hoy, Jairo y la enferma de hemorragias decidieron confiar en Cristo y dar un audaz paso de fe para buscar la curación. Creyeron en lo que aún no habían visto y por eso recibieron el premio que buscaban: Jairo vio con gozo inefable que su hija volvía a la vida, y la mujer sanó instantáneamente. ¡Qué bendición!

Estos son ejemplos patentes del tipo de fe que el Señor quiere ver en sus hijos. Probablemente todos hemos estado en situaciones en las que no nos hemos atrevido a actuar por timidez o por no querer asumir riesgos. Tal vez no hemos estado dispuestos a exponer nuestra propia integridad, nos inquieta el qué dirán o no queremos exponernos al fracaso.

Por ejemplo, ¿se nos ha ocurrido visitar a un vecino enfermo y ofrecerle orar con él para que sane? ¿Lo haría usted si supiera que Jesús lo está invitando a hacerlo? ¡Muchas personas dicen que el Señor les ha puesto inspiraciones como éstas en el corazón! Y sucede a veces que, cuando uno actúa con fe y se arriesga, descubre que los demás reciben esta demostración de amor y solidaridad con mucho agrado, aunque tal vez con un poco de nerviosismo.

Pero lo bueno es que posiblemente descubramos que el Señor ha tocado a un enfermo o un necesitado como fruto de nuestra oración y del testimonio de la confianza en Jesús que hemos demostrado.

Dile hoy al Señor que esperas con gran atención las inspiraciones que él quiera darte; dile que quieres superar cualquier temor y duda, y hacer lo que él te diga. Pídele la gracia de actuar por fe, siguiendo su guía y decídete a tocar a la puerta del Señor y ésta se abrirá, la puerta que conduce a una fe más profunda; la puerta que lleva a una mejor comunión con Jesús y a inimaginables bendiciones para los demás.


NEWS AND NOTES

Homeless Ministry: Volunteer lunch-makers







"Table of the Word"

Since the days of Demosthenes, the great Greek orator, people who had important things to say always proceeded to a place of prominence, generally somewhere above the gathered crowd. So, "going up" is typically descriptive of this action used by public speakers. Not surprisingly then, the place where important words are spoken in a church is rooted in the Greek word for "going up," namely *ambonein* or in today's vernacular the noun "ambo". The word also came to mean stage or platform, and is known by its Latin equivalent *pulpitum* or its more familiar English translation "pulpit." Many churches built before Vatican II had very prominent pulpits, since the sermon was the principal time in the liturgy when the people heard the bishop or priest preach in their language. This changed with the renewal of Vatican II, when scripture was reinstated as an important part of the liturgy and spoken in the people's language.

With the Vatican II emphasis on scripture in the liturgy, the more historic word *ambo* is now regularly used to describe the place at which the scripture readings are proclaimed in the liturgy. Another more theological term also describes its function, namely "table of the word," because the ambo is an essential complement to the "table of the Eucharist" commonly known as the altar. These two "tables" are where the two major parts of Mass, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist, take place as visually emphasized by similarity in location, design and material.

Like the table of the Eucharist (altar), the table of the Word (ambo) is sacred because in this place "God is speaking to his people, opening up to them the mystery of redemption and salvation; nourishing the spirit; Christ is present to the faithful through his own word." Since God's word is spoken from the ambo, it is uniquely blessed when first used. The bishop shows the lectionary to the people, hands it to the reader who solemnly carries it, places it on the ambo and proclaims the reading. This symbolic and profound action dedicates the ambo; no additional sign of the cross, holy water or incensing is used.

Thus, the ambo is marked as a sacred place and is reserved to the word of God. Only the readings from scripture, the responsorial Psalm and the Easter Proclamation (*Exultet*) can be done at the ambo. The homily and the general intercessions may also be done at the ambo, although they can be done at the presider's chair or elsewhere.

Church liturgical guidelines for the Mass reflect these principles and often require some particular changes in current practices. For example, the responsorial Psalm proclaimed after the first reading should be chanted (or recited) from the ambo. Secondly, because announcements are not scripture, they should be done following the Prayer after Communion and before the final blessing, either by the presider or other minister from a place other than the ambo. Likewise, special talks or appeals should be done at a place other than the ambo. These changes emphasize the sacredness of the ambo as the proper and foremost place to proclaim the word of God to the people.

"Mesa de la Palabra"

Desde los tiempos de Demóstenes, el gran orador griego, personas que tenían cosas importantes que decir, siempre iban a un lugar prominente generalmente, sobre la asamblea reunida. Por tanto, "ir a ese lugar" se describe típicamente como una acción usada para oradores públicos. No es entonces una sorpresa, que el lugar donde las palabras más importantes se digan en una iglesia venga de la raíz de la palabra griega *ambonein* o en los tiempos de ahora, "ambo". La palabra también vino a significar plataforma y conocido por su equivalencia en el latín *pulpitum* o en su más traducción en inglés "púlpito". Muchas iglesias construidas antes del Vaticano II, tuvieron púlpitos prominentes, ya que el sermón era el tiempo principal en la liturgia cuando la gente escuchaba al obispo o sacerdote predicar en su lengua. Esto cambió con la renovación del Vaticano II, cuando las escrituras volvieron a instituirse como parte importante de la liturgia y habladas en el idioma de la gente.

Con el Vaticano II, la palabra en la escritura de la liturgia más común es **ambo** y describe el lugar donde las escrituras leídas son proclamadas. Otra forma de describir su función es "mesa de la palabra," porque el ambo es una parte esencial a la "mesa de la Eucaristía" conocida como el altar. Estas dos "mesas" son las partes de mayor importancia en la misa: Liturgia de la Palabra y Liturgia de la Eucaristía, visualizan su localización, material y diseño.

Como la mesa de la Eucaristía (altar), la mesa de la Palabra (ambo) es sagrada porque en este lugar "Dios habla a su gente, sobre el misterio de redención y salvación; alimentando el espíritu; Cristo está presente a través de su palabra." Como la palabra de Dios se habla desde el ambo, se bendice cuando se usa por primera vez. El obispo muestra el Leccionario a la gente, y lo pasa al lector quien lo lleva solemnemente, lo pone en el ambo proclama la lectura. Esta simbólica acción es dedicada al ambo; no necesita nada adicional, como el signo de la cruz.

Por tanto, el ambo está marcado como un lugar sagrado y está reservado para la palabra de Dios. Solo las lecturas, Salmo responsorial y Proclamación de Pascua (*Exultet*) pueden hacerse desde el ambo. El sermón y las intercesiones también pueden ser desde el ambo, pero pueden hacerse desde la silla donde el sacerdote preside u otro lugar.

Guías litúrgicas para la misa, reflejan estos principios y a menudo requiere algunos cambios. Por ejemplo, el salmo responsorial proclamado después de la primera lectura debe ser recitado desde el ambo. Segundo, los anuncios no son escrituras, deben hacerse después de la oración de la Comunión y antes de la bendición final, bien por el sacerdote u otro ministro, desde otro lugar que no sea el ambo y lo mismo cuando hay algo especial. Estos cambios destacan lo sagrado que es el ambo para proclamar la palabra de Dios a las personas.


