

READINGS FOR JULY 19

His heart was moved. (*Mark 6:34*)

In today's Gospel, we see Jesus both encouraged and discouraged. He was encouraged because the apostles had just returned from a very successful missionary trip. They had healed some people, delivered others from demons, and brought many to conversion. But he was also discouraged because John, his friend and kinsman, had just been beheaded.

With this good and bad news on his mind, Jesus took a practical approach and invited the apostles to a quiet place for a time of rest (*Mk 6:31*). At least he tried to. A crowd of people followed them. So Jesus changed his plans and began to teach them.

In a sense, you could say that the "compassionate" Jesus overruled the "practical" Jesus. He saw beyond his needs and the needs of his disciples and focused instead on the needs of the people coming to them. You could say that his eyes were opened to a much wider picture. The apostles' eyes were opened as well. They gave up their plans for rest so that they could minister to the people.

Of course, Jesus wants us to be practical. He wants us to have our lives in order and to set goals and achieve them. But he also wants us to be flexible enough to be able to put aside our plans when the need arises and when the Spirit prompts us to. The key is learning how to sense the Spirit's promptings so that what is practical and planned doesn't overshadow what is compassionate and spontaneous. You may sense a prompting to speak to someone after Mass or in the grocery store. You may sense that God wants you to put your arms around your husband or child or that you should put aside what you are doing and read Scripture for a few minutes. Whenever something like this happens, try to act on it. You never know what miracles may result!

"Holy Spirit, help me to be open to your promptings. I don't want to be so regulated that I can't hear your voice. Lord, make me as flexible as you are!"

READINGS FOR JULY 26

He withdrew again to the mountain alone. (*John 6:15*) Did you ever think that Jesus would let the crowd make him their king after he had multiplied the loaves and fishes? That may be what they wanted, but Jesus chose otherwise. He chose humility.

In today's second reading, Paul tells the Ephesians and all of us, "Live in a manner worthy of the call you have received" (*Ephesians 4:1*). We tend to reduce this invitation to specific points of action: I have to do this good thing, and I have to avoid that temptation. But what if Paul were urging us to imitate Jesus first and foremost in our dispositions—especially in our humility?

True humility means trying to avoid building ourselves up in the eyes of others. It means trying not to judge people harshly or bring them down in hopes of elevating ourselves. It means even avoiding the pride that can pop up when other people remark on our humility!

How can we learn from Jesus how to be meek and humble of heart? The answer may be found in the way we yield ourselves to God and let his grace shape our hearts and our minds. When we stop trying to earn God's approval or achieve other people's recognition and allow ourselves to be fed and strengthened by Jesus instead, grace multiplies—just as the loaves multiplied when Jesus offered them to his Father. Yielding to the Lord like this will open us to the grace we need to do those things we find hard to do on our own. It will keep us from promoting ourselves because we will be keenly aware of how much we owe the Lord.

Today, tell Jesus that you want his grace to help you view yourself a bit more humbly and view other people a bit more highly. Tell him that without grace, it is impossible to be humble. Ask him over and over again, and watch as he transforms your heart.

"Lord, give me the grace to be just as humble as you were the day you fed the five thousand."



Early contact allows parents to be scheduled for the necessary sacramental formation session and godparents to obtain letters from their pastor.

If you are a registered parishioner at St. Matthew's and need a letter of good standing in order to be a godparent for a baptism to be celebrated at another parish, please call the Cathedral Rectory at 202-347-3215 to ask about obtaining a letter.

LECTURAS DEL 19 DE JULIO

El Señor vino al mundo principalmente para salvarnos, librándonos de la ignorancia y del pecado. No basta con "sentir" el toque divino; también hay que saber cómo actúa el Señor y aprender a ajustar nuestra vida a sus enseñanzas.

¿Deseas tú recibir la paz de Cristo? ¿Quieres librarte de los pecados que te tienen atrapado? Escudriña las Escrituras para conocer la sabiduría de Dios; pídele al Señor que te abra la mente cada vez que vas a Misa; incluso puedes colocar una o dos biblia en diversos lugares de tu casa, para acordarte de que hay que alimentar el espíritu.

Mantente despierto y alerta; haz lo que sea necesario para leer la Palabra de Dios todos los días y aplicarla en tu vida práctica. Recuerda que todos los días el Maestro está esperando que le abras la puerta de tu corazón.

LECTURAS DEL 26 DE JULIO

La multitud se maravillaba cuando veía que Jesús curaba a los enfermos y la gente lo seguía por todas partes. ¿Qué significarían estas señales? ¿Quién era este Jesús?

Jesús sabía que la gente que lo seguía tenía necesidades físicas y espirituales. Por su gran amor y compasión, realizó el milagro de la multiplicación de los panes y los peces como señal de su identidad. Viendo las doce canastas de lo que había sobrado, querían llevárselo a Jesús para hacerlo rey.

Pero Jesús no quería ser conocido como hacedor de milagros ni como el líder político enviado a liberar a los judíos de la opresión romana. La multiplicación de los panes y los peces era una señal que demostraba que Jesús era el Hijo de Dios. El Señor quería que esta señal les hiciera ver la inmensidad de su amor, amor que finalmente quedaría ratificado en su muerte en la Cruz.

MILESTONES IN CATHEDRAL HISTORY

1918 – Late in the summer of 1918, the influenza that had been epidemic in parts of the world spread throughout Washington. The death rate was extremely high and the District Commissioners forbade all public gatherings, including religious services, until the epidemic could be controlled. St. Matthew's church was left open during the day, but no liturgies could be held. St. Matthew's, along with churches throughout the city, suspended services for several months. The ban was lifted on October 31, 1918.

The anniversary celebration of our parish is best marked by the inspirations, gratitude, joy, and power of faith. Your stories and those of your ancestors reflect how St. Matthew's had shared the joy of the Gospel in downtown Washington, DC for 175 years. **Check the website front page to read the featured and archived stories!**

Gloria in Excelsis Deo

This most familiar phrase is one we typically associate with the hymn of praise sung most every Sunday as part of the entrance rite of the Mass. Another moment is when we hear it proclaimed within one of the traditional scriptural texts read at Christmas, namely Luke's gospel. And over the centuries, it has been the subject of magnificent choral pieces by famous and not so famous composers.

This song of praise had its beginnings in the Old Testament before Luke ever conceived of his gospel. And as the Church formed and grew through the centuries, so also did this "*hymnus angelicus*." From its simple beginnings in the Lucan text, the Church added phrases during the first two centuries so that it became the Trinitarian hymn of praise we hear today. Its early text in Greek came to us from the Byzantine church, later translated into Latin about 366AD. But whether in the Greek or Latin form, its first use in the Church can be traced to roughly 129AD when Pope Telesphorus prescribed its use at the mass celebrating the Birth of the Lord (Christmas). 300 years later, Pope Symmachus ordered the hymn to be said every Sunday and on special feasts.

Although originally sung by the people in the early centuries of the Church, this hymn came to be considered of such importance that only the pope sang this hymn. In later years, bishops were slowly given the privilege to sing it on Christmas and special feasts. It was not until the 11th century that priests were permitted to chant this hymn during the liturgy.

While the essential form of the hymn remained the same, still verses were added, modified or deleted over the course of centuries until Pius V issued an edict forbidding any further changes to the text he promulgated as part of the Roman Missal of 1570. It was also during this era that choirs now began to be a principal source for singing the hymn, a practice that lasted until the reforms of Vatican II, when the assembly again was encouraged to participate in singing the hymn in its vernacular translation.

Known as the Great Doxology, this pean of praise to the Trinity is almost as ancient as the liturgy itself and is a witness to the lyric poetry that comes to us from the earliest of Christians. Truly, Glory to God in the highest and peace to his people on earth!!

Gloria in Excelsis Deo

Esta es la frase más familiar que típicamente asociamos con el himno de alabanza que se canta cada domingo como parte del rito de entrada de la misa. Otro momento es cuando lo oímos proclamar en uno de los textos de las escrituras tradicionales leídos en Navidad, expresamente en el Evangelio de Lucas. A través de los siglos ha sido tema de piezas corales magníficas por famosos y no famosos compositores.

Esta canción de alabanza tiene sus comienzos en el Antiguo Testamento antes de que Lucas siquiera concibiera su evangelio. Y a medida que la Iglesia se formó y creció a través de los siglos, también lo hizo este “*hymnus angelicus*. ” Desde sus simples comienzos en el texto de Lucas, la Iglesia añadió frases durante los dos primeros siglos y llegó a ser el himno Trinitario de alabanza que escuchamos ahora. Su texto en los primeros tiempos en griego, nos vino de la iglesia bizantina, luego traducido al latín en el año 366 después de Cristo. Pero ya sea en la forma griega o latín, su primer uso en la Iglesia puede ser localizado en el año 129 después de Cristo, cuando el Papa Telesphorus prescribió su uso en la misa celebrando el Nacimiento del Señor (Navidad). 300 años después, el Papa Symmachus ordenó que el himno fuera dicho en cada domingo y fiestas especiales.

Aunque originalmente fue cantado en los siglos primeros de la Iglesia, este himno vino a ser considerado de tal importancia que solo el Papa cantaba este himno. En años más tarde, los obispos tuvieron el privilegio de cantarlo en Navidad y ocasiones especiales. No fue hasta el siglo XI, que a los sacerdotes se les fue permitido el cantar este himno durante la liturgia.

Mientras que la forma esencial del himno permaneció lo mismo, algunos versos fueron añadidos, modificados o quitados a través de los siglos hasta que Pio V, publicó un edicto prohibiendo más cambios al texto que el promulgó como parte del Misal Romano en el 1570. Fue también durante esta era, que los coros empezaron a ser una fuente principal para cantar el himno, una práctica que duró hasta la reforma del Vaticano II, cuando la asamblea de nuevo, fue animada a participar en cantar el himno en su traducción original.

Conocida como la gran fórmula, este elemento de alabanza a la Trinidad es casi tan antigua como su liturgia y es un testigo a la poesía lírica que viene a nosotros de los primeros cristianos. Verdaderamente, ¡Gloria a Dios en el Cielo y paz a los hombres en la tierra!


