e watchful! Be alert! (Mark 13:33) It's the First Sunday of Advent, and you have just received an invitation: The Most High God requests the honor of your presence at the entry of his Son into the world. This unprecedented event will be followed by a joyous celebration in two locations: heaven and earth. The event will take place on December 25, and you are encouraged to spend the next four weeks preparing for the festivities.

Welcome to Advent—a season of hope and expectation! Over the course of the next month, you may be part of family gatherings. You might reenact time-honored traditions: buying gifts, decorating homes, and preparing special meals.

And to crown all these observances, Jesus himself will come and visit you. As today's Gospel tells us, we may not know when he is coming, but he promises he will come. Even now, he is looking for new ways to touch your heart. Right now, he is preparing special gifts of grace and blessing for you—Advent and Christmas presents that he will give as you open your heart to him.

What kind of gifts will he give? Reminders of his Father's love. A sense of hope as you face life's challenges. New insights and wisdom that you can share with your loved ones. Freedom from guilt as you lay your sins and failings at his feet. And above all, peace and joy as he tells you that he has you in the palm of his hand.

So take up his invitation today! Do everything you can to be alert and ready to receive Jesus and his gifts. Try to spend a little more time in daily prayer and Scripture reading. Go to Confession so that you can get rid of anything that blocks you from receiving his love and his gifts.

Jesus wants to celebrate with you. And he's given you a whole month to get ready! Step by step, day by day, you can draw closer to the Lord—and feel him draw closer to you!

#### Take a Moment and Take a Look in the Cathedral!



The mosaic at left is located to the left of the statue of Our Lady in Our Lady's Chapel.

It shows angels holding back the curtain of time to reveal St. Joachim and St. Anne at the fountain of the Golden Gate.

The scene is laid against the glow of the setting sun, symbolic of the advanced years of St. Anne and St. Joachim, when it was made known to them that they would have a child, Mary.

Between them at the bottom of the mosaic flows a fountain.

From this fountain there springs a genealogical rod, at the top of which St. Anne presents to the world her child, Mary, who is to be the Mother of Christ.

#### THE PROPHETS ISAIAH AND ADVENT

Many of the first readings at Mass during Advent come from Isaiah. Isaiah stands out in this period of expectation and waiting for its beautiful and poetic presentation of the hopeful lead-up to the yearned for coming of Jesus, at Christmas and the Second Coming. But it is helpful to recognize that just as there were three magi who came from the East to recognize the birth of the King of the Jews, so too there are three different Isaiah presentations in this wonderful Book of the Old Testament—of the original one and of two later disciples.

Scripture scholars recognize that the Book of Isaiah is an anthology:

- A) Chapters 1-39, writings relate to the early prophet himself (740-687);
- B) Chapters 40-55, known as Deutero-Isaiah (Second Isaiah), focus on the Exiles (597-538);
- C) Chapters 56-66, known as Trito-Isaiah (Third Isaiah), focus on post-Exile (c. 537-510).

Thus the full Book covers a period of over 200 years.

In FIRST ISAIAH, Chapters 1-39, Isaiah's style reflects variety of expression, a very literate person, clarity of thought, precision and balance of phrase. A master of the language, he stands out for the beauty of his poetry as well as the sheer power of his faith. His experience of God is above all one of holiness, as his vision shows.

Chapters 1-12, his early ministry, center around the pressure on young King Ahaz to avoid foreign alliances and the need of faith. Chapters 6-12, sometimes referred to as the Book of Emmanuel, contain the great Isaiah themes, especially chapter 6 on the call of Isaiah, and chapter 7:10-14 on the prophecy of the Messiah (a maiden/virgin shall conceive). While the child predicted probably was Hezekiah, Christians see Jesus here. Isaiah is a prophet extolling the holiness of God, from whom salvation comes.


Two institutions dominate his life and work: a) Jerusalem (Zion)—the place of Yahweh's Temple and David's throne, and b) the Davidic Covenant. While for Isaiah the Sinai covenant was conditional, the Davidic covenant was not. However, ultimately the people are dependent on the true KING.

DEUTERO-ISAIAH covers the two Babylon Exiles (597) and (587-538), in Chapters 40-55, and King Cyrus' victory over Babylon. It begins in 40:1 already with "Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God." Notable are the four servant songs that Christians feel are a preview of what Christ will be forced to suffer. Another beloved verse from chapter 52 is "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings good tidings..." Deliverance is in store for all.

TRITO-ISAIAH covers the period when those in Exile returned and met up with the remnant. This prophet is active in the rebuilding period and knew the writings of the great Isaiah and the work of the prophet in Exile. The theme of comfort again is repeated. Chapter 61 (3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Advent) previews Jesus preaching in Nazareth: God's intervention on behalf of His people. Already in Chapter 56 there is openness to foreign nations and gentiles.

## Sunday, December 3, 2017 Keep Alert

Today's Readings: Isaiah 63:16b–17, 19b; 64:2–7; Psalm 80:2–3, 15–16, 18–19; 1 Corinthians 1:3–9; Mark 13:33–37. Today's readings may not be what you expect as this season of hope and longing begins. Two general themes unfold during Advent: the first two Sundays invite the Church to reflect on the Second Coming of Christ, while the final two Sundays direct our attention more specifically to the Incarnation. Along with the readings, be attentive to the Collects, or Opening Prayers, during the next few weeks, to notice these themes.

The overarching theme for today is "Keep alert." The First Reading, a communal lament (63:16b–17, 19) and a prayer (64:2–7), focuses our attention on a hurting world. When there is suffering, it is easy to complain or become

cynical and forget God's faithfulness. St. Paul is telling us that in Christ we have already received the gifts we need to remain faithful during this life, this in between time. This is important information as we look to the Gospel. Jesus is very clear that we do not know the day or time of the Second Coming. Like the servants whose master is away, we have been charged to continue preaching the Good News, to keep our "house" in good working order.

We must remain watchful so that at that final hour, we may be found ready to give all glory and honor to the living God. This week, as you prepare your Jesse tree, consider the ways our ancestors were watchful and remained faithful. What might help you remain vigilant?



## THIS WEEK AT HOME

## Monday, December 4 Peace

At the beginning of Advent, the Church invites us to ponder the Reign of God. The First Reading paints an image of God gathering and instructing the nations. God's instruction leads the nations to unity and peace. Our world continues to be divided so we must continue to pray for peace and strive to make known the Reign of God. Also, do you notice a familiar text in the Gospel? We say this prayer before receiving Holy Communion. At dinner, take some time to discuss this phrase and its relation to the Eucharistic table. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 2:1–5; Psalm 122:1–2, 3–4b, 4cd–5, 6–7, 8–9; Matthew 8:5–11.* 

## Tuesday, December 5 Jesus Revealer of the Father

In today's Gospel, we see Jesus rejoicing over what God has revealed to the disciples. To understand the reference the reader needs to read verse 17 of the chapter, which describes a battle between good and evil. Like the disciples, we must be watchful, work for justice, and fend off evil. Those who have seen Christ know the Father. Today, create a Jesse tree with your family and discuss Christ's role in salvation. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 11:1–10; Psalm 72:1–2, 7–8, 12–13, 17; Luke 10:21–24.* 

### Wednesday, December 6 St. Nicholas

The message of the First Reading and Gospel helps us understand St. Nicholas' desire to serve the poor and needy. Jesus, whose love is overflowing, inspired Nicholas to give generously to others. Instead of seeking gifts today, read about St. Nicholas and decide how your family might share its resources with the poor. *Today's Readings: Isaiah* 25:6–10a; *Psalm* 23: 1–3a, 3b–4, 5, 6; *Matthew* 15:29–37.

## Thursday, December 7 St. Ambrose

Advent invites us to look into our hearts to discern our willingness to listen and to respond to God's call. The readings today tell us that only the just will enter God's Kingdom and stand firm amidst adversity. Is your heart open to the Father's will? In what ways do you struggle to listen and respond to God? Take time today to journal and name ways you are living the Father's will. *Today's Readings: Isaiah* 26:1–6; *Psalm* 118:1 and 8–9, 19–21, 2–27a; *Matthew* 7:21, 24–27.

## Friday, December 8 The Immaculate Conception

Today's solemnity celebrates God's grace working in Mary that kept her free of sin from the moment of her conception. The Gospel passage helps us understand that throughout her life she cooperates with God's grace. Confronted by the angel Gabriel, she puts aside her entire self and says yes. She is the New Eve, the mother of all the living. Unlike Eve in Genesis, Mary humbly and obediently accepts God's will and brings forth life in Jesus. After dinner, sing the Magnificat and discuss the powerful images. *Today's Readings: Genesis 3:9–15, 20, Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; Ephesians 1:3–6, 11–12; Luke 1:26–38.* 

## Saturday, December 9 Discipleship

Jesus, in today's Gospel, commissions the disciples to "cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons" as part of their mission to proclaim the Reign of God. In Baptism each of us was commissioned to live in such a way that our lives proclaim the Good News. What does it look like to "cure" the sick or "drive out" demons today? Jesus is calling us to go to the margins and proclaim God's Reign. Today, consider celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Today's Readings: Isaiah 30:19–21, 23–26; Psalm 147:1–2, 3–4, 5–6; Matthew 9:35—10:1, 5a, 6–8.







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
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
