READINGS FOR AUGUST 3

Give them some food yourselves. (Matthew 14:16) Tony Melendez was born without any arms. But he was also born with a gift for music, so he developed a unique way to share that gift. He played with his feet, starting with a push-button organ and moving to the guitar and harmonica. Combining his musical gifts with his faith, Melendez became involved in music ministry.

In 1987, he played before Pope John Paul II, who leaped out of his seat, embraced the young man, and said, "My wish for you is to continue giving this hope to all the people." Melendez is still doing that through his ministry, giving concerts and motivational talks, supporting people with disabilities, and helping young-adult and missionary programs.

Tony Melendez is a perfect illustration of the principle we see at work in today's reading. The disciples didn't have that much going for them. Five loaves and two fish couldn't possibly feed such a huge crowd! But they brought their meager portion to Jesus, who blessed it and gave it back to them. Notice: he didn't distribute the meal himself. He told the disciples to do it. Not sure what to expect, they handed out the bread and fish—and the impossible became possible!

By telling the disciples to feed the crowd themselves, Jesus made it clear that the miracle would not happen without them.

What do you have to offer today? Don't worry if it seems paltry. Offer it to the Lord anyway. Give him your work, play, or study. Give him the difficult situation that you're dealing with. Give him your imagination or your anxieties. Ask him to bless it, transform it, and use it for his Father's glory. Then, like Tony Melendez, work with whatever you have. As you do, you'll find God's power multiplying your offering, "feeding" the people around you.

"Lord, I give you my heart. Thank you for accepting me as I am. I trust that you will let none of my gifts go to waste!"

READINGS FOR AUGUST 10

he Lord was not in the earthquake. (1 Kings 19:11) How often have you seen a movie where God appears amidst lightning bolts and angelic choirs and then speaks in a terrifying, booming voice? Images like these are so common that we may think that this is how God normally speaks. Add to that all the biblical stories where God intervenes on an even larger scale, and we come away thinking that's the only way we'll ever hear the Lord. After all, very few of us are in the habit of being interrupted by a deafening voice or a lightning bolt from on high!

That's why today's first reading is such a blessing. It tells us that God doesn't always thunder from the heavens. Sometimes—quite often, in fact—his voice comes in a "tiny whispering sound" (1 Kings 19:12).

Why would the Creator of the universe talk so softly? Maybe because he wants to teach us how to listen, just as he taught Elijah. Maybe because he wants a relationship with us—just as he had with Elijah—rather than have us live in fear of his showing up.

The fact that we aren't always being overwhelmed doesn't mean that God is avoiding us. Quite the opposite, in fact. He's always speaking! He loves to guide our thoughts and our steps. He loves to open our hearts to his truths and heal us of our hurts. No, God speaks softly and intimately so that we will take the time to slow down. He wants us to learn how to quiet our racing minds so that we can focus on him and his word.

God doesn't want to overwhelm our eyes and ears every time he has something to say. For one thing, that would get awfully exhausting! But even more important, he wants us to see him as our loving Father, not as a frightening deity. Like any other father, he wants to spend time with us so that we can learn his ways and receive his wisdom.

So sit quietly today. Breathe deeply. And listen.

Interested in Becoming Catholic? "The RCIA, which stands for Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, is a process through which non-baptized men and women enter the Catholic Church. It includes several stages marked by study, prayer and rites at Mass. Participants in the RCIA are known as catechumens. They undergo a process of conversion as they study the Gospel, profess faith in Jesus and the Catholic Church, and receive the sacraments of baptism, confirmation and Holy Eucharist. The RCIA process follows the ancient practice of the Church and was restored by the Second Vatican Council as the normal way adults prepare for baptism. In 1974 the Rite for Christian Initiation for Adults was formally approved for use in the United States" (www.usccb.org). The RCIA also is for adults baptized in other Christian traditions who wish to receive the sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist in the Catholic Church and for adults who were baptized in the Catholic Church and wish to complete their initiation. SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

How does the Assumption of Our Blessed Mother help our journey?

"But now let us ask ourselves: how does the Assumption of Mary help our journey? The first answer is: in the Assumption we see that in God there is room for man, God himself is the house with many rooms of which Jesus speaks (cf. Jn 14:2); God is man's home, in God there is God's space. And Mary, by uniting herself, united to God, does not distance herself from us. She does not go to an unknown galaxy, but whoever approaches God comes closer, for God is close to us all; and Mary, united to God, shares in the presence of God, is so close to us, to each one of us.

There is a beautiful passage from St Gregory the Great on St. Benedict that we can apply to Mary too. St. Gregory the Great says that the heart of St. Benedict expanded so much that all creation could enter it. This is even truer of Mary: Mary, totally united to God, has a heart so big that all creation can enter this heart, and the ex-votos in every part of the earth show it. Mary is close, she can hear us, she can help us, she is close to everyone of us. In God there is room for man and God is close, and Mary, united to God, is very close; she has a heart as great as the heart of God.

But there is also another aspect: in God not only is there room for man; in man there is room for God. This too we see in Mary, the Holy Ark who bears the presence of God. In us there is space for God and this presence of God in us, so important for bringing light to the world with all its sadness, with its problems. This presence is realized in the faith: in the faith we open the doors of our existence so that God may enter us, so that God can be the power that gives life and a path to our existence. In us there is room, let us open ourselves like Mary opened herself, saying: "Let your will be done, I am the servant of the Lord". By opening ourselves to God, we lose nothing. On the contrary, our life becomes rich and great.

CHILDREN'S RELIGIOUS EDUCATION -- ST. MATTHEW'S CATHEDRAL -- 2014-2015



The Religious Education program at St. Matthew's Cathedral exists to provide sacramental preparation for First Reconciliation, First Eucharist, and Confirmation as well as ongoing faith formation for children who have received these sacraments. It strives to communicate the Good News of Jesus Christ in the context of the beliefs and practices of the Roman Catholic Church. The program presents the four fundamental themes of the Catechism of the Catholic Church – Creed, Sacraments, Morality, and Prayer – in such a way that the children of our parish begin to understand how to live the Gospel.

When and where are classes held?

Classes are held weekly on Sunday mornings from 9:45 to 11am in the St. Matthew's Education Center located at 1726 N Street NW. LECTURAS DEL 3 DE AGOSTO

uando los discípulos vieron que la gente venía buscando al Señor y que ellos no tenían ningún momento de privacidad con él, bien pudieron haberse sentido frustrados. Jesús los había llevado a un lugar desierto porque necesitaban tiempo para guardar duelo y reflexionar sobre la triste noticia de la ejecución de Juan el Bautista. Después de todo, Jesús había perdido no sólo a su primo, sino a un gran profeta y un poderoso testigo de su propia identidad y de su misión en el mundo. Pero a pesar de todo eso, tuvo compasión de la multitud y sanó a los enfermos (Mateo 14, 14).

Al caer la noche, los discípulos le aconsejaron que despidiera a la gente que les había interrumpido el momento de descanso; pero el Señor sabía que su trabajo no se limitaba a beneficiar solamente a unos pocos privilegiados, sino a todos los que quisieran creer, y para que sus discípulos así lo entendieran, les mandó hacer algo que realmente era un gran desafío: dar de comer a tanta gente. Ellos no vieron más allá de lo físicamente visible: apenas cinco panes y dos pescados. Pero Jesús tomó lo poco que había y lo transformó en una cena abundante, suficiente para toda la multitud, y hasta sobraron 12 canastas de pan.

Cuando le pedimos a Dios que atienda a nuestras necesidades y las de nuestros semejantes, por lo general descubrimos que el Señor nos pide a nosotros que pongamos de nuestra parte todo lo que podamos, aunque nuestras fuerzas sean escasas y nuestros medios insuficientes. Luego, el Señor toma lo que hayamos hecho y lo transforma en algo milagroso.

El episodio de la multiplicación de los panes y los peces nos alienta a avanzar más en la fe, sabiendo que cuando nos esforzamos sinceramente, Dios puede multiplicar de un modo maravilloso lo que hayamos puesto en sus manos, porque siempre quiere colmarnos de su amor, tal como lo hizo en esta ocasión.

LECTURAS DEL 10 DE AGOSTO

uando Jesús caminó sobre las aguas es interesante observar que, al principio, Pedro llamó a Jesús diciéndole "Kyrie", que significa "Señor" pero el modo en que la usó san Mateo claramente elevó a Jesús por encima del plano humano.

Al parecer Pedro se sintió confiado cuando le dijo al Señor que le mandara ir hacia él caminando sobre el agua, pero cuando empezó a hundirse y temió por su vida, gritó alarmado "¡Kyrie!" Entre una y otra exclamación, Pedro perdió de alguna manera la percepción del verdadero significado del título "Señor".

¿Qué quiere decir esto? Que cuando le llamamos "Señor" a Jesús debemos preguntarnos: ¿Tengo yo realmente fe en él? ¿Estoy dispuesto a confiar plenamente en él? ¿O pierdo la fe, como Pedro, cuando veo que me hundo en problemas, dolores o sufrimientos?

Los padres de la Iglesia primitiva pensaban que la barca de este pasaje representaba a la Iglesia, porque al principio los discípulos no pudieron ver a Jesús en ella cuando la tormenta amenazaba con hacerla zozobrar, pero el Señor vino y calmó la tempestad. Jesús está siempre con nosotros, aunque no lo veamos, y está presente especialmente en tiempos de turbulencia y peligro.

La experiencia del poder de Jesús quedó grabada en forma indeleble en la mente de todos los que presenciaron el hecho desde la barca (la Iglesia). Por eso, cada uno debe tomar personalmente la decisión de confiar total y absolutamente en el Señor (como Pedro), pero tal decisión no debe tomarse en forma aislada. San Pablo dijo que todos somos un solo cuerpo, la Iglesia, y que Cristo es su cabeza (1 Corintios 12, 12). De modo que siendo miembros del mismo cuerpo, podemos aprender de las vivencias de fe de los demás y ayudarnos los unos a los otros a permanecer firmes en la fe.

"Señor Jesucristo, sé que a veces la 'barca de Pedro' se ve zarandeada por fuerzas adversas y poderosas, pero sabiendo que tú vas en ella, no tengo nada que temer."
