#### "A THRILL OF HOPE"

"A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices ..."

Often when we think of a "weary world," we realize how much it describes our world today: fractured relationships, disappointments, worry, illness, grief, hunger and homelessness, violence, international conflict and war, political and interracial unrest.

Yet this line—"a thrill of hope the weary world rejoices"—from our muchloved Christmas hymn "O Holy Night," describes the world of Jesus' time as well as our time too.

In our journey to wholeness—to holiness—we as a human family are always struggling with our imperfections, our selfishness, and our need to be first, powerful, and in control. Yet, in the midst of that, there are always thrills of hope—hope because God lives within our midst, hope because many, many people respond to the call to be hope-filled, caring people for others.

When asked why he called the Second Vatican Council, Pope St. John XXIII replied, "To make the human sojourn a little less sad." He knew that it was the role of the church, the role of Jesus' disciples, to walk with others in heartfelt hope and compassionate caring, especially amid the challenges of life.

.... In a troubled, imperfect world, our Advent-Christmas season reminds us that we have reasons to be grateful and rejoice—because of the One who brings us hope by becoming one of us, intimately walking our journey with us.

Amid our new reality, our **homeless neighbors** still need food, clothes, and rental assistance. Children are enrolled in our English and Spanish **religious education programs**, and adults in our **RCIA program** are seeking to become Catholic. Cathedral maintenance and cleaning is more important than ever to provide a **safe space for worship** during this time. Staff members who lead our ministries and maintain parish operations must be paid and their benefits funded. Insurance premiums and loan payments must be made, and other regular expenses paid.
