My dear parishioners and friends,

At this time each year we normally start to think of family gatherings, parish events, thanking God for his many blessings at Thanksgiving, and the upcoming great celebration of Christmas with family and friends. These are joyful occasions, times to remember God's gifts to us, especially in the person of his son, Jesus.

On that note, I first invite you to join in the celebration of a bilingual (English and Spanish) Mass on **Thanksgiving Day, November 26** at 10am. I will be the celebrant and Fr. Benson, the homilist, with our rectory priests concelebrating. You are most welcome - in person or watching the livestream on YouTube (<u>www.youtube.com/c/cathedralofstmatthewtheapostle</u>). Offertory donations will go to our Social Justice ministries. In our **new reality** dealing with Covid-19, masks, safe distancing, and smaller gatherings – including at Mass – are necessary. Thus, our Thanksgiving Day Mass is limited to 100 persons, as are all Masses.

Meeting Jesus, Nurturing Hope

This year, in this **new reality**, we need hope more than ever. This year we really need Jesus. During this Advent we need to make an inner journey on the landscape of our hearts that takes us to meet, to encounter, the Lord Jesus at its center. We have the opportunity to reorient our lives by deepening our intimate communion with God, considering God's vision of what our world is like, rethinking our values and allowing our relationship with the Lord Jesus to change our behaviors and lives.

This new reality causes us to seek out Jesus in our brothers and sisters, to make sacrifices towards keeping us all safe, to strive to come ever closer to Jesus. We are called to find Jesus in the domestic churches of our families, in our neighborhoods and workplaces, in prayer, at Mass whether in person or via livestream.

A central message of Advent is **HOPE**. In a beautiful seasonal reflection, Janet Schaeffler says the following:

Angels are often present in our Advent/Christmas readings. One of their messages is the same in all the instances: there is nothing to fear. Often we find that message a challenge; it's easier to believe in angels than to believe that there's nothing to fear.



Mary was perplexed by Gabriel's message. As we live our daily lives, our lives in our church, nation, and world, we, too, experience fear and confusion. Why is this happening? What's going to happen to us? How can there be suffering, a pandemic, disappointments? How can injustice, hatred, and violence continue to exist?

Like Mary, we have angels in our midst to remind us that life and hope are always possible even if the world tells us the opposite. The good news Mary receives is that nothing is impossible with God. Like Mary, we can be afraid and confused about the logistics of how things will work out, but, at the same time, know that God is with us, waiting for our yes to join God's plan to make new things possible.

It is my wish this Advent and Christmas that you will be free from discouragement and assured that Jesus is always by your side, showering you with deep, lasting hope.

Giving Hope and Recognizing our Shared Mission

Just as each of us seeks the treasures of Christ in our own lives, so we also are called to share Jesus with others. You, our parishioners, are the key to fulfilling not just our common mission, but our shared Cathedral parish mission of bringing life to Jesus' command to love one another. During this pandemic we must come together to enable our parish - a beacon of hope in downtown Washington, DC for 180 years - to continue the work entrusted to us.

In the midst of this pandemic, our **homeless neighbors** still need food, clothes, rental assistance, and much more. We have children in our English and Spanish **religious education programs**, and adults in our **RCIA program** wanting to become Catholic. Regular and thorough cleaning of the Cathedral is more important than ever to provide a **safe space for worship** during the pandemic. In order to meet these needs, staff members who lead our ministries and

maintain parish operations must be paid and their benefits funded. Insurance premiums and loan payments must be made, and other regular expenses paid.

Restructuring to Balance the Budget

As we finalized our 2020-2021 budget in June, we hoped and prayed for a quick end to Covid-19 and the related restrictions. We all know the reality.

First quarter income for this fiscal year has not kept pace with the budget. Offertory giving is down \$20,116 from last year; general contributions, down \$38, 905; wedding donations, down \$16,250; total income, down \$129,147 from last year! I saw the need for cuts in individual ministry budgets but also a real need for restructuring of staff and music positions to balance the budget. All three choirs were cut (a major financial saving). Cantors' hours were reduced. I also cut hours in early fall for most staff members. All of these cuts together have saved us approximately \$175,000. Benefits have remained the same – one of the items I insisted would not be cut. Without the staff and music cuts (which I intend to be temporary), and the other cuts, our deficit would be much greater than the current \$65,156.

Nothing is Impossible with God!

We continue our work while placing hope in the message that Mary received - nothing is impossible with God. We need your help. If you currently support St. Matthew's financially, we thank you. Consistent, regular giving is vital to our existence and sustainability – and **I ask that everyone give something**. So many of you are generous donors; I am so grateful. We are so happy to have all of you as parishioners, but we need all of you to become donors. You may be struggling as we are, but it is true that a little makes a big difference if all chip in. We simply cannot meet our basic operating needs without you. My staff took big cuts so that the least among us can at least have the necessities.

Christmas Masses

Because we anticipate that our Masses will continue to be limited to 100 persons, attendance at Christmas Masses will be **by reservation only**. You, our parishioners, may request reservations **beginning Monday, November 30** by calling our reservations line at **202-587-5134** and leaving a voice mail message with your request, and your name and phone number. You will receive a call back to complete your reservation. Please do not leave more than one message or call before November 30. When we return your call, if space is available you will be able to reserve seating for **yourself and up to four additional household members** at the Mass of your choice (see the schedule below). Face masks will be required to enter the Cathedral, and social distancing of six feet (but likely not more than six feet) between (not within) registered household groups will be maintained. **Guides will greet you, check you in, and seat your group according to our seating plan**. We look forward to celebrating the Nativity of the Lord with you and your loved ones!
